



Oskar Schindler was a Nazi industrialist whose efforts saved approx. 1200 Jews from the German death camps of World War II. His audacity, amazingly, even had Jewish women transferred to his business that were already at Auschwitz to be destroyed in the crematoriums!

He used his entire fortune of millions and risked his own life for years to save them. This opportunity left him virtually destitute when the war ended in 1945 until his death in 1974.

He is the only Nazi to be buried at Mt. Zion in Jerusalem and who is called a "righteous gentile" by a thankful nation of Israel.

When Germany surrendered and the Jews in his care were finally safe, it was now him that would be hunted by the Allies as a Nazi criminal.

Rather than being in fear of this or relieved or proud of what he had accomplished, it is said that Schindler said his goodbyes to the Jews with uncontrollable sobbing and anguish at what he didn't do!

Schindler realized that his opportunity to save more Jews was now at an end.

He was remorseful, as he realized that people died that he could have saved!

He admitted that he had spent money frivolously on himself that could have been used as bribes to save more Jews.

Even his gold Nazi party lapel pin he still wore, he lamented, could have been traded to save one more life.

He said, "I didn't do enough!"

He gave millions and jeopardized his life, but in his heart he knew he could have done more!

He knew the truth, even though many praise him even to this day.

Each of us must face the truth about ourselves?

We can avoid it, hide from it, put on a good show for everyone and maybe even accomplish a great deal like Schindler did, but one day truth will hunt us down and find each of us!

If we're fortunate, truth will find us today and tomorrow and every day until we die.

Like Schindler, I squandered a lot of time and money in my life, rather than doing more to save lives from the lake of fire.

Although I try to make up for it now.

I try to save just one more life... and then another and then another... God does His end.

Each of us can do it, as we don't need to be a TV evangelist to produce spectacular results, even greater than what Schindler accomplished.

Don't believe me?

In 1937 Christian Wolfkes an old carpenter in a village in the mountains of Romania prayed like this: "My God, I have served you on earth and I wish to have my reward on earth as well in heaven and my reward should be that I should not die before I bring a Jew to Christ, because Jesus was from the Jewish people. But I am poor, old and sick. I cannot go around seeking a Jew. In my village there are none. Bring a Jew into my village and I will do my best to bring him to Christ." God brought a Jew named Richard Wurmbbrand to him. Wolfkes gave him a Bible... he was converted. Wurmbbrand was later ordained, spent 14 years in prisons being tortured for Christ by the communists, wrote 22 books that still reach and comfort people today, became an international speaker and founded the international organization The Voice of the Martyrs. I would say millions have been reached by this ministry... Rhoda even heard Wurmbbrand speak in Romania! All starting from one old carpenter with a prayer request who handed out one Bible!

Ask God how you can save just one life... and then... ask for just one more... and then...
